



Community Youth Strategy Speak Out Report 2009

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The United Way of Thunder Bay hosted a *Roots of Youth Violence Forum* which was held on March 5th 2009. Sixty participants from various service organizations, the city, government and school boards were in attendance. The outcome of this forum acknowledged four main themes and six priority areas that could be used as broad categories to start the process of developing and implementing a community youth strategy.

The four themes that were identified were:

1. Community working together to make and carry out a community youth strategy
2. Community awareness of youth priorities and strategies
3. Making sure the cultural context is a working part of the strategies and priorities
4. Youth in leadership roles to create and carry out a local youth strategy



The six priorities identified were:

1. Anti Racism and Discrimination
2. Education
3. Employment
4. Housing
5. Recreation and Youth Hubs



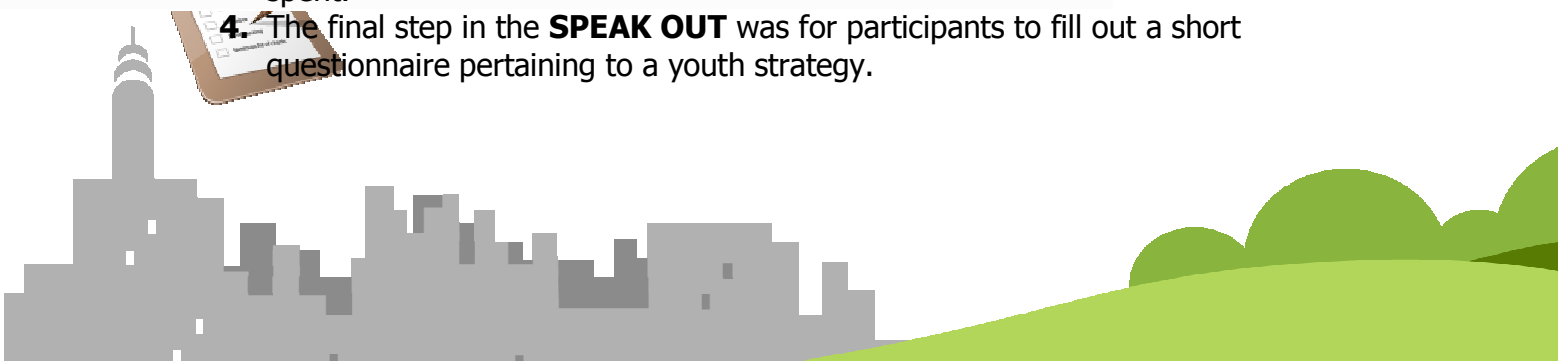
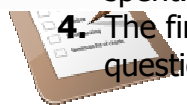
As part of the next steps to the *Roots of Youth Violence Forum*, a plan to hold a **SPEAK OUT** was formulated.

- We held two **SPEAK OUTS** at Hillcrest High School and Intercity Mall on May 6th and 7th respectively. Together, a group of young people from Confederation College (Child and Youth Workers) and Lakehead University (Social Work) took this information and presented it to the public.
- Participants of the **SPEAK OUT** were asked to voice their opinion on a local youth strategy. In order to encourage participation from the public, we offered a prize for the general public as well as a prize aimed specifically for youth.
- The six priority areas were divided into booths and each participant was asked to go through and answer the questions in a variety of ways.



Participants were asked to:

1. Fill out a demographic participant form
2. Go through booths 1-6 and talk to the presenters by making comments and asking questions.
3. After, participants were given "**SPEAK OUT DOLLARS**" and were asked to put the money into the "priority" boxes where they thought the money should be spent.
4. The final step in the **SPEAK OUT** was for participants to fill out a short questionnaire pertaining to a youth strategy.



We asked 170 members of the community to provide feedback on 6 Questions related to our priority areas. Here's what they had to say.



Q1: Should Thunder Bay have a strategy in place that will work towards addressing the needs for youth?

A: 168 say **Yes**

2 say **No**

Q2: Should youth be in a leadership role in the planning, developing and carrying out of a community youth strategy?

A: 161 say **Yes**

8 say **No**

Q3: Does the cultural diversity of our community need to be considered when planning a youth strategy?

A: 139 say **Yes**

30 say **No**

1 person did not respond

Q4: Do you believe the City of Thunder Bay should provide resources towards the planning, development and implementation of a "new" community youth strategy?

The results are in. Here is what 183 members of our community had to say. Each participant was asked to rank, in order of importance, a list of strategies that could help address issues within these 6 priority areas.

Anti-Racism and Discrimination

- Face to Face Meetings between victims and perpetrators –a disciplinary committee 41
- Peer education and mentoring 38
- Community campaign “Different Colour, One People” 24
- More aboriginal and non-aboriginal role models and peers 23
- Youth to employer training 14

Housing

- Opening a Youth focused only shelter house to better serve at risk/homeless youth 62
- Additional youth section within Shelter House to hold more beds for the homeless/at risk youth 62
- To have youth strategies in place with the housing and homeless organizations 40
- More support and accessibility when youth apply for Ontario Works 17

Support to Families

- Neighbourhood hubs are needed where at risk children and youth can go do activities and receive any support they may need 63
- An awareness of all programs that are available within the community to let the families and youth know that there is a lot of help and support out there. 57
- Survival skills camp, available for youth and family taught traditionally and non-traditionally by Elders 35

Employment

- More youth employment opportunities 53
- A youth facility that is for YOUTH only 35
- Employment agencies need to work flexible hours 21
- Providing free or low cost training 16
- Ensuring youth are taught health and safety and have awareness to work place hazards 15
- Onsite training for youth i.e. use of a computer or till 12
- Providing free or low cost equipment and uniform related to employment 6

Education

- Presentations in schools dealing with youth issues 49
- A coordinated response to youth issues and violence led by youth 37
- Cultural teachings intergraded into the curriculum 33
- Continual inter-ministry funded projects 26
- Openness to further cooperative initiatives within the community 13

Recreation and Youth Hubs

- More low cost or free recreational activities 83
- Youth hubs in neighborhoods with many activities taking place 32
- After hours/weekend activities 29
- Cultural sensitivity training for leaders 18
- Community calendar of youth activities 8

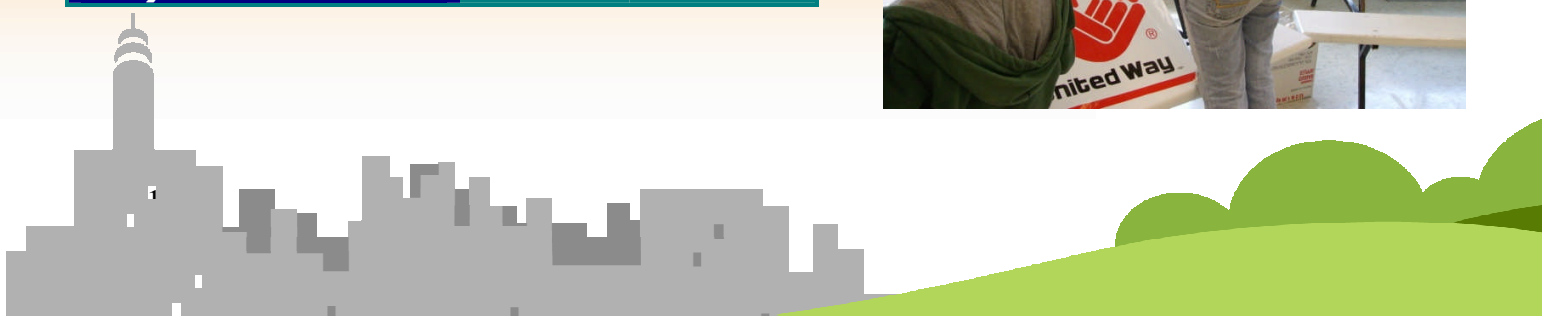

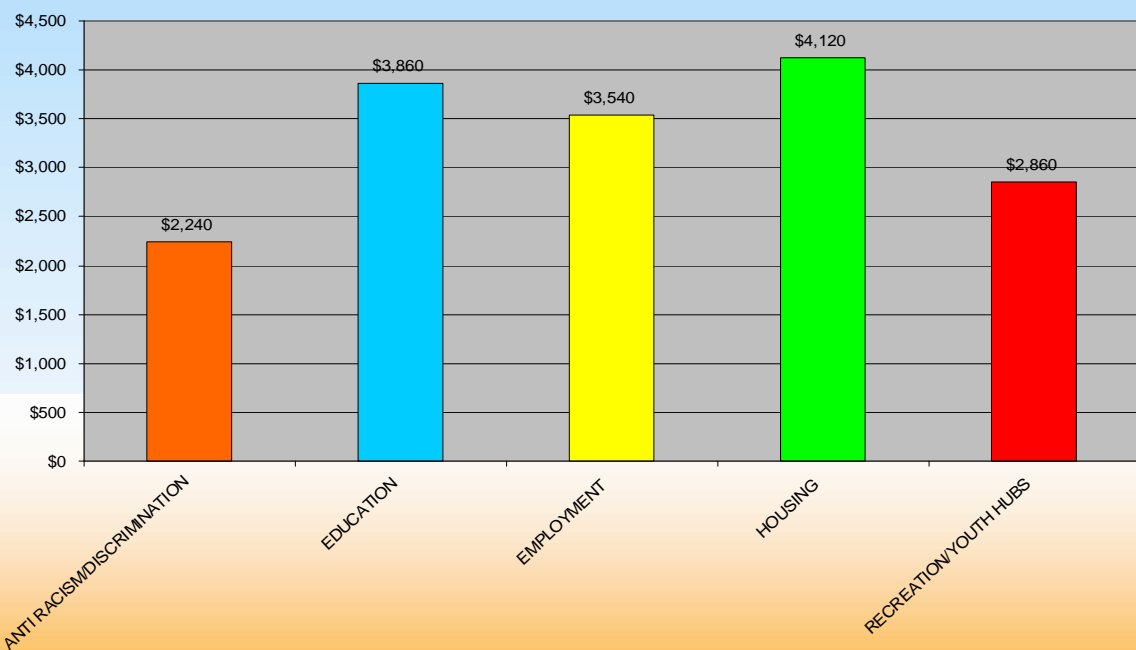

Additional Comments from Speak Out and Survey



Additional comments on each of the 6 priority areas from Speak Out participants.

Housing

- Supply opportunity for jobs
- More housing options for youth leaving child residential programs and entering adult- specifically mental health
- Stronger incentive to get off Ontario Works
- Most important would be to have work (chores) within shelters -discipline
- Ensure options and services are accessible to all
- To solve the problem for now more beds... however a shelter house specific for youth is an amazing long term goal
- One house for children and one house for adults
- Involvement from city council
- Stand alone youth shelter
- More intensive trained staffing within supportive shelter houses
- Focus on secondary student homes
- Street theatre programs for homeless youth
- Focus on gap age
- Services that are accessible to all exceptionalities
- Having a "kids help line" in Thunder Bay only more intensive support for youth.



Anti-Racism and Discrimination

- Cultural programming
- Cultural events in schools and community
- Youth drop in (occupying youth)
- Organizations like AIDS Thunder Bay can be a resource especially when dealing with stigma, discrimination...
- More subliminal positive campaigns (ex: Coke in the 80's)
- "Walk in my Shoes" seeing what it is like to have a disability, youth disabilities are often left out
- Multicultural displays and fashion shows

Support to Families

- To find a way to help the fortunate help the less fortunate
- Places where families can gather for support and a feeling of community
- Ensure services are accessible to all
- 212 miles street Native Women's Association-lots of family support
- Métis Nation of Ontario –lots of family support
- Agencies need to work together more and end silo-ing of agencies – more partnership efforts are needed
- Training for parents on how to get involved in child's activities
- Traditional teachings
- Have a fun day and cultural activities combined

Employment

- Transportation to and from employment agencies
- Not just aboriginal achievement awards but awards for everyone
- Youth friendly staff at employment centre desks
- Better busing access i.e. FWFN has no regular busing
- Stress importance of education to youth
- Youth auxiliary options with city police, parks and rec, city of Thunder Bay etc.
- Employer training/education re: hiring and retaining youth

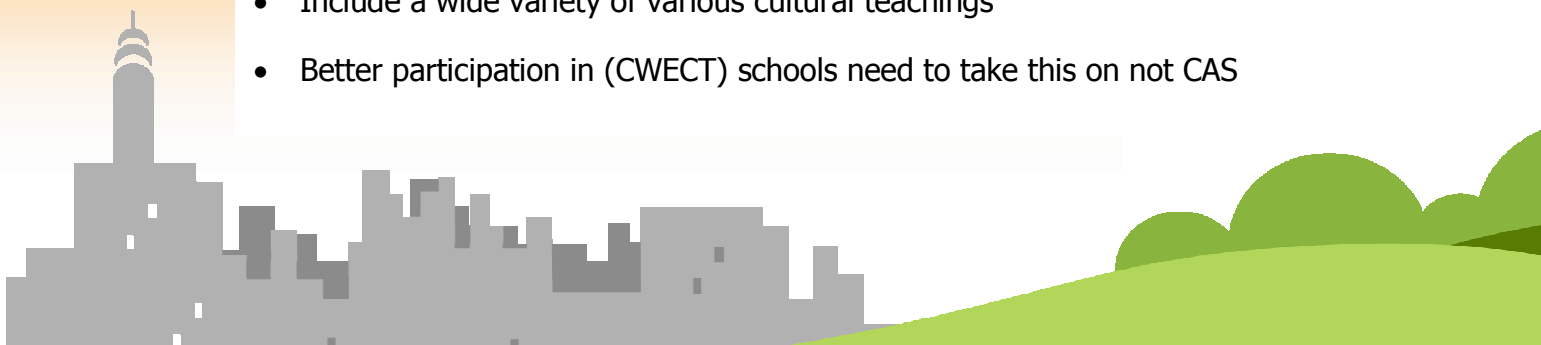


Recreation and Youth Hubs

- See youth recreation as positive rather than youth gatherings as negative
- More park activities after hours
- New Hope represent
- Skilled counselors and recreation leaders at youth hubs
- Often feel like a minority/ out of place bringing "white kids"
- More hubs like Thunder Bay Boys and Girls clubs in many neighbourhood locations and schools. Forest Park is good, but transportation is hard for east-enders and other "at risk" neighbourhoods throughout town
- Fundraising events that would raise money for those who cannot afford user fees
- Have a place for us teens
- Have volunteers (youth) to help fundraise ex. Beading, jump-a-thon
- A pet activity park
- Activities that include more than sports i.e.) music, art, theatre etc.
- Ensure that hubs are completely accessible to all and that deaf youth can be involved. Right now, they aren't.
- Recreation should be free for all kids
- Have a youth section in newspaper or monthly calendar delivered or given to them at school
- More activities and free sporting events

Education

- Respect-zero tolerance does not work
- Put more money into alternative education for youth
- Natural helpers should be in every school
- Anti-bullying programs in every grade
- More contact between high school and post secondary students
- Include a wide variety of various cultural teachings
- Better participation in (CWECT) schools need to take this on not CAS

- This was a very good presentation largely because the youth voice was prevalent. Well Done!
- The more knowledge the better the youth understand for a better future.
- Keep up the good work.
- Community board in the mall. Communication and positive advertising at youth events.
- The community of Thunder Bay should be building awareness around youth activities most of the time, not the media.
- Lots of community partners would like to be part of the solution: teachers, schools, Aids Th.Bay, Superior Points, Thunder Bay District Health, etc.
